## ESSENTIAL Steps in Studying God's Word

## **OBSERVATION:**

- 1. **Who?** Who was writing? To whom was the original message written? Who are the people involved in the scenario? (The first few lines of each book, a study Bible, or gotquestions.org can help you with this.)
- 2. What? What is happening? What is said? Is it a command, exhortation, a rebuke, a question, an answer, a prayer, a quotation of other scripture, something else? What is the main point? What are the key words?
- 3. When? Are there time references? Are there words related to past, present, or future events?
- 4. Where? Are there locations mentioned?
- 5. Why? Are there clues about why things are being said or done?
- 6. **How?** Is there an explanation of how something is done?

## INTERPRETATION:

- 1. The literal principle. Is it symbolic, literaly, poetry?
- 2. The historical principle. What is the meaning to the original audience?
- 3. The context principle. How do we interpret this verse by the verses surrounding it?
  - a. Start with the big picture of the text. Then zoom in on the context. Finally, focus on the details.
- 4. The compatability principle. The best commentary on the Bible is the Bible. What other verses "sing the same song while hitting other notes?"
- 5. The Jesus principle. How does it point to Jesus?

## **APPLICATION:**

- 1. Is there a command to obey?
- 2. Is there an example to follow?
- 3. Is there a promise to claim?
- 4. Is there a sin to avoid?
- 5. Is there a principle to follow?
